Library

Young Fearnhill library enthusiasts were invited to join an author talk at St Francis school, Letchworth.

The author in question was Katya Balen who read an extract from her book *October, October* and students were asked to consider what 'off-grid' means - the character October in the book lives off-grid until her 11th birthday when her Dad has an accident and her life changes dramatically as she is moved to the city.

Katya uses a lot of sensory language in the book as October interacts with the environments that she lives in.

Students were given a sherbet lemon and were encouraged to think about describing it using their senses as they held and then ate it. Students then wrote a paragraph describing the sweet from October's point of view remembering that she had always lived self-sufficiently so they needed to describe it using things she would know, she would perhaps never have tasted a lemon before.

Some observations from our students:

"Sherbet lemons taste crunchy and hard like uncooked carrots and the flavouring is sour - the opposite of mango."

"It tastes sour and sweet like a green apple, hard like a rock. I hear it sliding across my teeth. It smells sweet. It gets sticky between my fingers like a dead caterpillar. It is sweet like tree sap."

"A sherbet lemon tastes quite sour. It has a rough feeling. It sounds like something hard banging on a wall and smells sweet like a strawberry."

Year 10 Exams

Students in Year 10 are now over halfway through their GCSE courses. Mock exams will take place this month and further mocks will take place in Year 11. The Year 10 mock exams will start on **Thursday 22nd June and finish on Monday 10th July**, as publicised on the school website.

Examinations will usually take place in the hall and students will follow the exact pre-examination procedures as they will during their GCSEs. For morning exams, students will go to registration at 8:30am, then meet in the canteen at 8:40am. In the afternoon, students take an early lunch at 12:45pm and then go to the gym for 1:15pm. If students do not have an exam, they are to go to their normal lessons. Students will be allowed to go straight home after they have finished exams in the afternoon. Alternatively, students can go back to their timetabled lessons where they will be supervised by staff until the end of the day.

In most cases, students who perform well in Year 10 mock exams go on to perform well in their final GCSE exams. Therefore, it is really important that students recognise the value of preparing carefully for these exams to help them achieve well in their GCSEs. Sport

Year 10 sports students visited the University of Bedfordshire to experience what studying sport at a higher lever might involve.

They received a talk on covering what going to university involves, not just studying but living independently, financial support available etc.

Students then enjoyed two practical sessions. In one they were introduced to the latest health monitoring equipment, wearing heart monitors while they worked so they could track their activity. In the second practical session they were taught by a member of the university staff as if they were PE teachers.

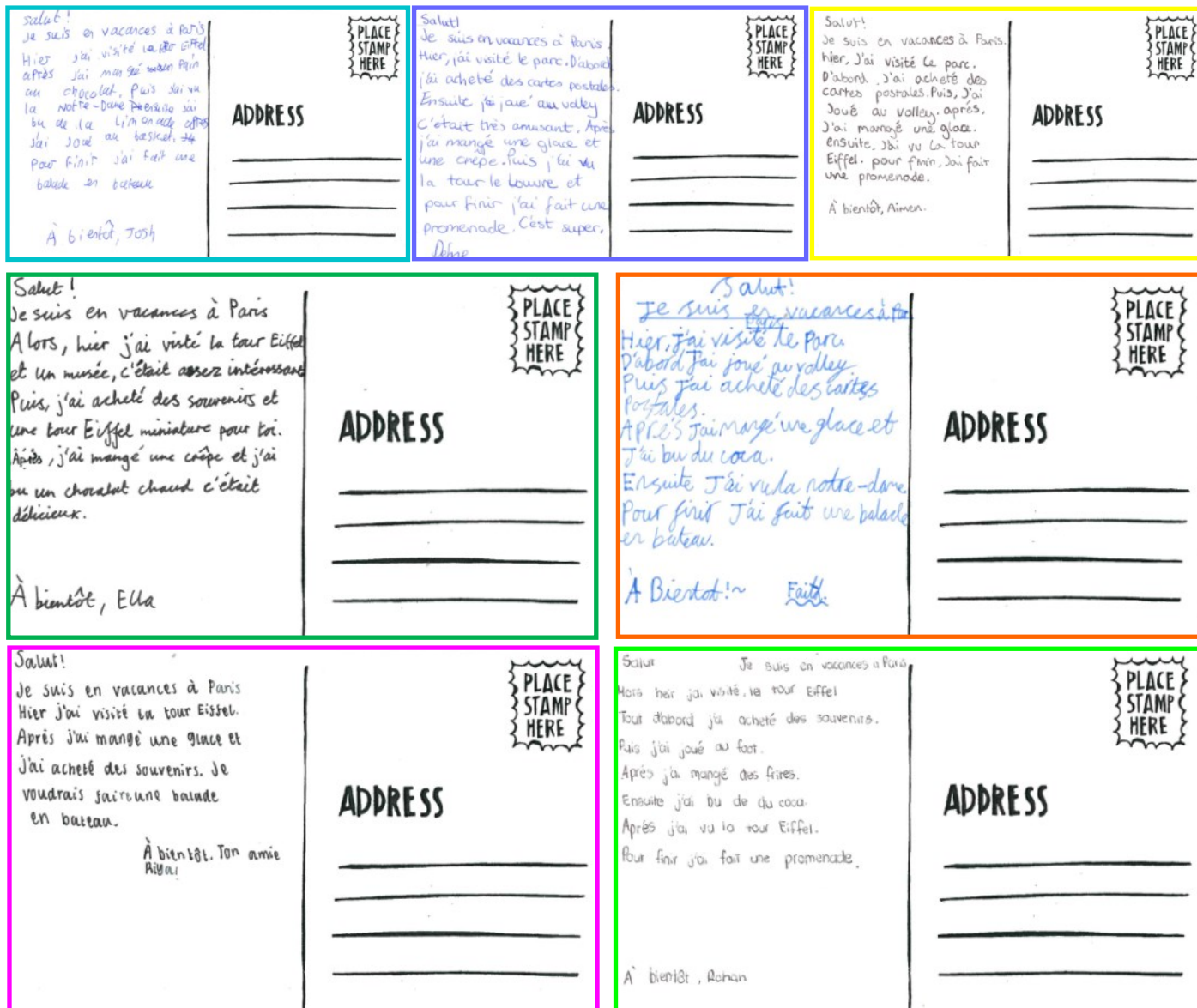

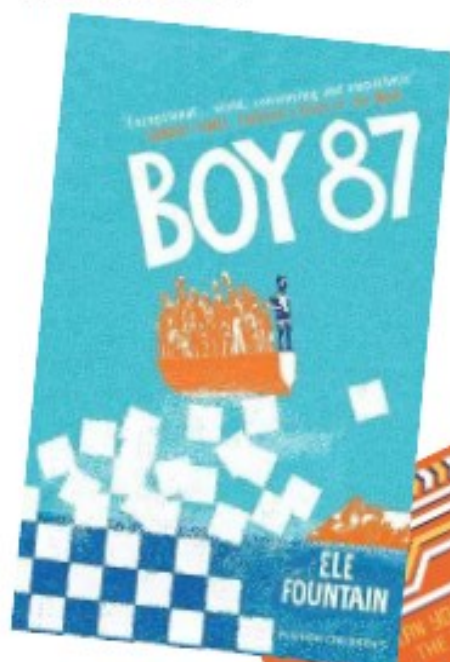

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about MONEY MULING

Money muling involves individuals – very frequently young people – being recruited to transfer illegally obtained funds into and out of their bank account on behalf of criminals (often without even realising that's the kind of activity they've become embroiled in), and usually being allowed to keep a certain amount for themselves. It's essentially a digital form of money laundering. This guide highlights some of the risks associated with money muling, and provides parents and carers with useful tips to help safeguard young people against becoming ensnared by this growing online hazard.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

LEGAL REPERCUSSIONS

Young people may be lured by the promise of quick, easy money, but by doing so they will become unwitting participants in activities that can have severe legal and financial consequences. Money muling is a serious offence under UK law: involvement in such schemes can result in imprisonment and fines (or both). Remember, the threshold for criminal responsibility in the UK is 10 years of age.

ONLINE RECRUITMENT

Cyber-savvy criminals are increasingly using various online methods, including social media apps and gaming platforms, in their attempts to recruit young people as potential money mules. The criminals often display persuasive, deceptive tactics to gain children's initial interest and attention, then seek to exploit their trust and naivety.

POSSIBLE EXPLOITATION

Money muling is frequently carried out in tandem with other organised criminal activities such as the drugs trade or human trafficking. Not only is money muling a criminal offence in its own right, therefore, but it could also expose young people to harmful situations as well as potentially putting them in contact with some extremely dangerous individuals.

FINANCIAL LOSSES

If they (even unknowingly) transfer funds that are traced back to criminal activities, money mules can face considerable financial losses: their bank may freeze their accounts, and they can be held liable for any illegally obtained funds. People involved in money muling often also find themselves at greater risk of becoming entangled in other forms of criminal financial exploitation and fraud.

LONG-TERM CONSEQUENCES

Involvement in money muling can have a lasting negative impact on a young person's reputation, education and employment prospects, and place colossal strain on their family life. A conviction for financial fraud would significantly damage a young person's future opportunities: they could be blocked from opening a bank account, taking out a mortgage or even securing a phone contract.

Advice for Parents & Carers

EDUCATE AND COMMUNICATE

Talk to your child about the risks and consequences of money muling, emphasising the importance of making informed decisions and seeking guidance if they need it. Create an open, non-judgmental space which encourages them to share their concerns and experiences, ensuring they feel comfortable getting help if they suspect they may have become involved in money muling.

MONITOR ONLINE ACTIVITIES

If you have concerns, you might want keep a closer than usual eye on your child's online presence, including their profiles on social media and any gaming platforms that they use. These can often serve as useful early warning systems which might help you to detect any signs of attempted recruitment by criminals or other types of suspicious behaviour.

TALK ABOUT MONEY

Discussions about avoiding being recruited as a money mule are also good opportunities for a refresher with your child about financial responsibility and good money management. It's also a helpful starting point for highlighting the importance of earning their money by honest means and the potential consequences of getting involved in illegal activities, both online and offline.

STAY INFORMED

Criminals' methods and approaches to recruiting young people as money mules frequently evolve to reflect the online landscape. Try to stay aware of criminals' current tactics and make time to regularly check out resources provided by schools, law enforcement and financial organisations. The Don't Be Fooled Campaign (at www.moneymules.co.uk) has plenty of useful information and advice.

REPORT YOUR SUSPICIONS

If you have reason to believe that your child, one of their friends, or someone they know has been recruited into a money muling operation, seek support and then report your suspicions. For your own safety, please **don't** attempt to directly confront anyone you suspect of organising money muling. Instead, contact Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555 111.

ORAL HEALTH FOR YOUNG PEOPLE

WHAT IS TOOTH DECAY?

Tooth decay is when the hard outer surface of a tooth is broken down or damaged by bacteria and acid making holes in the teeth, called cavities. Tooth decay can cause pain, and infections, and problems with eating, speaking, playing, learning, smiling and socialising.




Tooth decay occurs when foods and drinks with sugars and starches are left on the teeth.

REDUCE THE RISK OF TOOTH DECAY

- Brush teeth twice a day with fluoride toothpaste - no rinsing
- You should see a dentist at least yearly
- You should have fluoride varnish at each visit, this is free to all young people
- Use fluoride toothpaste containing between 1,350 ppm and 1,500ppm of fluoride
- Clean in between your teeth every day using floss or interdental brushes

WHERE TO ACCESS A DENTIST


Scan the QR code or search "Find a dentist" for the NHS website.




Dental care is free for children and young people aged 0-19.

TOP TIPS

- Brush teeth morning and bed-time for 2 minutes with fluoride toothpaste
- Only use a pea-sized amount of toothpaste
- Spit out after brushing and don't rinse - if you rinse, the fluoride won't work as well
- Fizzy drinks, fruit juices and sugary snacks should be limited to meal times
- Brush to the beat - why not download the Brush DJ app and brush to your favourite song?
- Set reminders and timers on your phone
- Go electric with an electric toothbrush

We have made reduced price tickets to London Zoo available for those receiving Universal Credit, Working Tax Credit, Child Tax Credit, Employment and Support Allowance, Income Support or Jobseeker's Allowance.

These tickets are **only** available to purchase online in advance, for up to six people per household (under 3's go free and do not need to book – but must be accompanied by an adult with a booked ticket).

These tickets **must be** [booked online in advance](#) of your visit, as only full price tickets are available to buy at the gate.
