





Levels of Education

In England, Wales and Northern Ireland there are 8 qualification levels (1 - 8) plus an entry level qualification for those just starting. Generally, the higher the level, the more difficult the qualification is. Levels 1-3 are typically taught in schools and colleges.

With so many different qualifications, it can be hard to know what they mean and where they might lead to next. To help you understand, we've created a summary of what the levels mean comparing the different routes to higher education.

WORK EXPERIENCE

During PSHE lessons, Year 10 students are learning the importance of virtual work experience and preparing for the world of work. Over the coming editions we will be covering details of 15 good work qualities to help impress employers!

Communication Skills

Excellent communication skills are an advantage in virtually any work environment. You're likely to communicate with customers or colleagues in some way as part of your duties. Having the ability to communicate information concisely and effectively can help you show your value as a candidate. This includes strong verbal, written and physical communication skills. Your ability to demonstrate flexibility as a communicator is another strength that potential employers may value. Eg. you may tailor your writing style to various different target audiences.





What are Communication Skills?

Communication skills allow you to understand and be understood by others. These can include but are not limited to communicating ideas to others clearly, a friendly and confident demeanour, respecting other points of view and speaking in a public setting. Developing your communication skills can do much to help you advance in the workplace. In this article, we explain what communication skills are and how you can improve your own. You use communication skills when giving and receiving different kinds of information. This can be written, spoken, typed or even body language. You might need to communicate ideas, feelings or what's going on around you. Communication skills involve listening, speaking, observing and empathising. The skills are important whether you are speaking face-to-face, on a video call or through letters and emails.

Communication Skill Examples

There are many different types of communication skills that you can make use of professionally. Continued practice will make you an effective and confident communicator. A lot of these skills work in collaboration with each other. This means that it is necessary to practice different communication skills whenever you get the chance. This could be at work, at home or when speaking with a friend or colleague.

Here are some skills to keep in mind:

Active listening Adapting your communication style to your audience Friendliness

Confidence Offering and taking feedback Volume and clarity

Empathy Respect Understanding body language Responsiveness


